May is Month To Check Car For Safety

Check your car and you'll check accidents and do it now for tomorrow may be too late. In offering this suggestion to California motorists, Commissioner E. R. Caldwell of the California Highway Patrol reminded that May is the month for special emphasis on vehicle maintenance throughout the nation.

"Previous voluntary safety checks have uncovered at least one faulty condition in one of every four cars tested," he said. "California law requires that every vehicle be maintained in safe mechanical condition in order to lawfully operate on the streets and highways of the state," Caldwell pointed out.

He advised every motor vehicle owner and operator to give himself the following test: "Can I see, steer and stop safely?" "Such a test," Caldwell explained, "will cause drivers to check mirrors, window glass, windshield wipers, lights, steering mechanisms, wheels, brakes and tires. If these items, together with horn and exhaust system, are in safe condition the vehicle should be ready for road use.

"It is inexcusable negligence to operate an unsafe vehicle," he admonished.

CAP Squadron Joins in Wreck Marker Mission

South Bay Squadron 43, Group Seven of the Civil Air Patrol based at Torrance Municipal Airport, participated in an old aircraft wreck marker mission ordered by the U. S. Air Force recently. The advanced base was Cable-Clearmont Airport, from which the squadron operated with six airplanes, four mobile units, one ground rescue team, 20 senior members and 19 cadets.

Liquor License Fees Top \$6,000

Torrance received \$6,545 in liquor license fee earnings recently for the six-month period ending Feb. 28, according to figures released by William G. Bonelli, Fourth District member of the State Board of Equalization.

The total amount distributed to cities and counties of the state by State Controller Robert E. Kirkwood was \$5,542,218, bringing the amount paid local governments during the current fiscal year to \$8,500,935, and total distributions since repeal to \$93,237,178.

Of the total, Los Angeles County and its cities received almost a third of the total.
