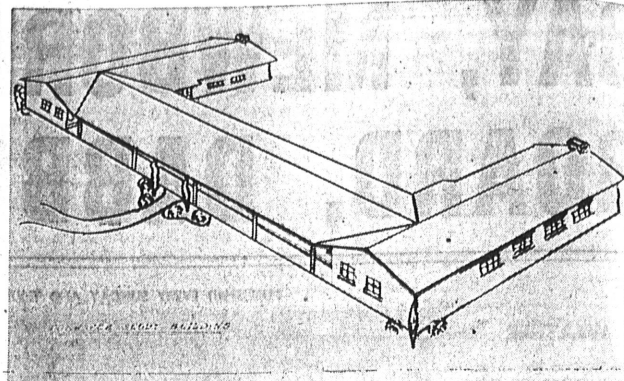
Plans for the proposed \$32,000 to \$35,000 building have been drawn free of charge by an architect and a lease has been secured from the city for the site, according to Mrs. Robert Mowry, secretary of the Torrance Scout Center organization.

The building will be located behind the YWCA, Mrs. Mowry said. It will contain offices for Girl and Boy Scout executives,

connected with Scouting in the local area.

Provisions for the largest scholarship to be offered El Camino College students were completed recently on campus, Dr. William H. Harless, director of instruction, announced.

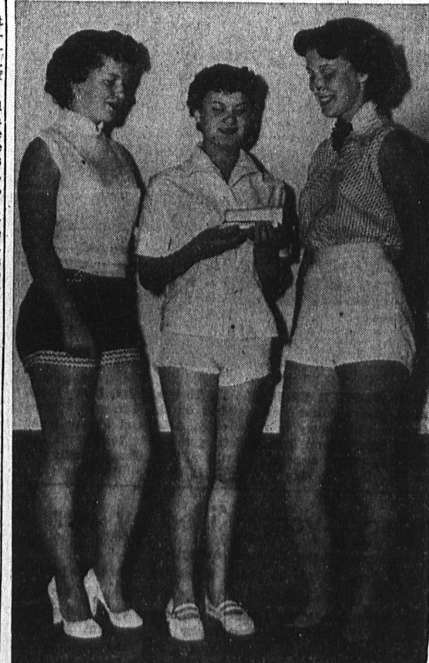
