Safety in Automobiles

Safety in Automobiles Testing organizations continue to tell the American buying public that American auto mobile manufacturers are not giving sufficient attention to safety considerations. In through and scientific tests if has been demonstrated that several simple changes in automobile body structure could save many lives, and pre-vent many disfigurations annually. One of the safety features which could easily be installed in automobiles is an over head brace, or roll bar, as racing drivers call it, which would prevent the root of automo-biles from eaving in if they turn over. Al-thoug we are aware of the fact that automo-set at a number of threm are turned over sever day of the year. And in these accidents an unceessary number of drivers and passen-gers lose their lives because the root caves in and crushes the occupants. Anothe safety factor which most auto-

Most analytical tests prove that the type of brakes used on a vast majority of U.S. built automo-biled over a sustained application. Another safety device which would prob-aby save more lives than any other thing, and certainly prevent more permanent disfig-urations, is the safety-strap. Safety-straps should be worn by all those who are going to do prolonged high-speed driving. 

On the contrary, a great deal of evidence has been introduc-ed proving that what actually was sought for this soldier was considerable extra work, in addition to his Army du-ties, for the benefit of a Sen-made clear that Schine was to be given passes which would not interfere in any way with his regular Army training, but which would permit him to work for the subcommittee dur-ing time normally used by sol-tiers for personal and recrea-tional activities. 
