Lesson-Sermon For Sunday on Love of God

That God is Love and that God's love makes man vital, strong, helpful, and protective is pointed out in the Lesson-Sermon on "Love" to be read in all Christian Science churches on Sunday. The Golden Text from II Corinthians (13:11) reads, "Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you."

From Luke's Gospel (10:33-35) is taken Jesus' parable of the good Samaritan. He finds a traveler who has been robbed and beaten, and none would help him. "But a certain Samaritan," says Jesus, "as he journeyed, came where he was; and when he saw him, he had compassion on him, and went to him, and bound up his wounds, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him." And when he departed, he said to the host, "Take care of him; and whatsoever thou spendest more, when I come again, I will repay thee."

"Our Master taught no mere theory, doctrine, or belief, but the love of God, which is the love of man," said Mary Baker Eddy in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures." She continues, "It was the divine Principle of all real being which he taught and practised. His proof of Christianity was no form of system of religion and worship but Christian Science, working out the harmony of Life and Love" (p. 28).

Western Song Queen Seen In 'Oil Town'

Pretty Cindy Walker, "Queen of the Western Song Writers," will demonstrate her many talents as one of the stars of "Oil Town, U. S. A.," a Billy Graham evangelistic film to be shown free of charge at the Civic Auditorium tomorrow night at 8 o'clock.

Miss Walker will sing one of her own compositions — "Christian Cowboy" — in the picture, which features full-color scenes of the Texas City disaster of 1945.

The film tells the story of a Houston oil millionaire who discovers religion after his daughter's life has been endangered in the Texas City holocaust.

Other well-known luminaries are Colleen Townsend Evans, of recent Hollywood fame; Paul Power, Robert Clarke, Georgia Lee, Ralph Hoopes and Harper, and Miss Walker, who starred in "Mr. Texas," one of Graham's earlier films.
