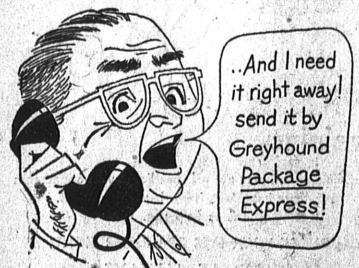


A. F. Pauliny Honored on 72nd Birthday
