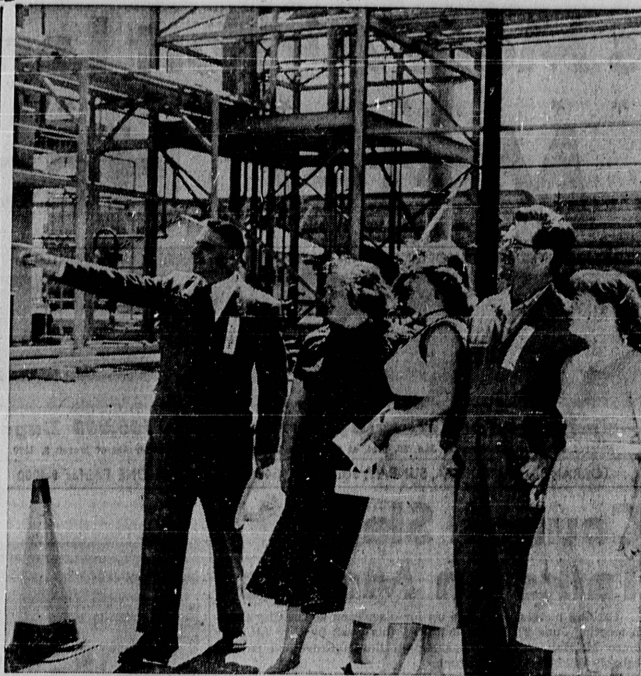

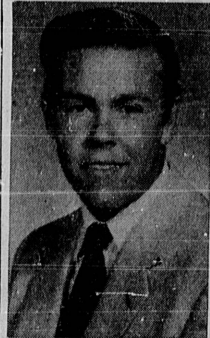
Seasiders Plan Program
