The wife of the local attorney and her two daughters, Alice and Betsy, left by plane for the East Wednesday.

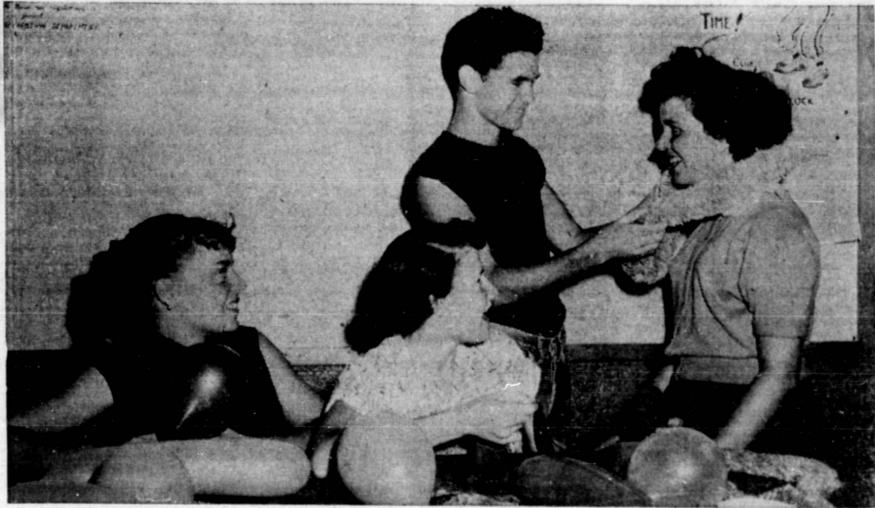
'Tacky' Dance Slated by Harbor Hospital Group
