

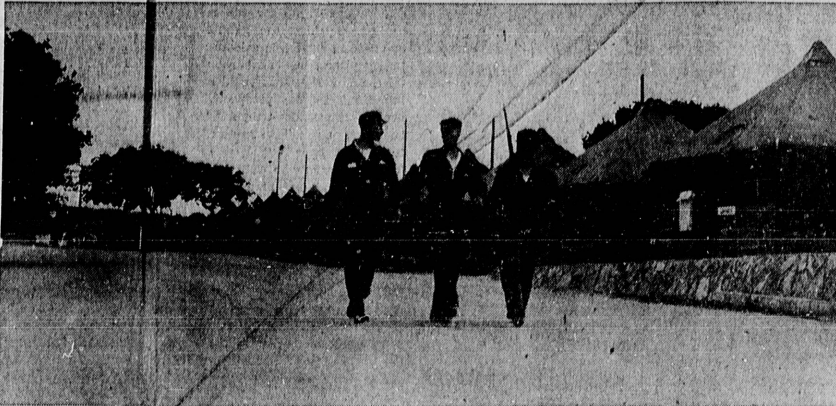

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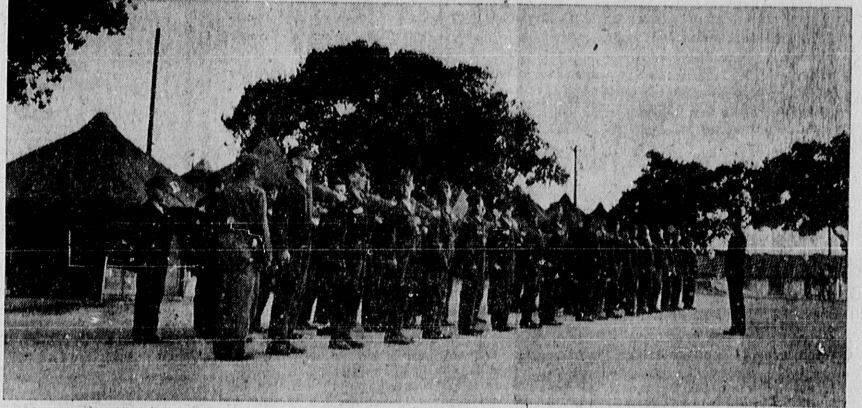
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Local Cadets Shown at Fort Ord

Nine Torrance Cadets at Camp

FORT ORD, Calif.—Nine Torrance boys are among the 1025 young California Cadets who flocked here this week for a two-week summer training program.

Arriving Sunday, June 20, the boys were issued fatigue uniforms, blankets, a Springfield drill rifle and were bedded down in the East Garrison section of the 28,000 acres comprising the Sixth Infantry Division here.

The East Garrison is a tent city, five boys assigned to each semi-permanent hut.

The boys also observed a demonstration of weapons conducted by faculty members of Fort Ord's Sixth Infantry Division. The Sixth Division, one of the leading battle organizations of World War II, now is the major infantry training center for the West Coast.

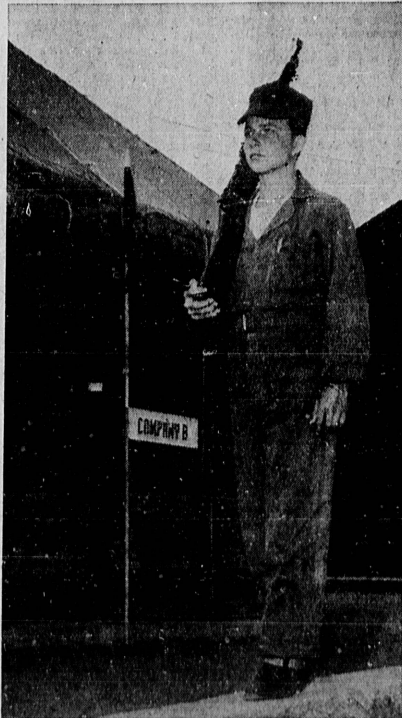
