




Nine Torrance Cadets at Camp

RECEIVES SAFETY AWARD... Morse G. Dial, president of Union Carbide and Carbon Corporation, accepts the award of honor on behalf of his company's emoloyees for safety accomplishments last year. During 1953 the accident frequency rate for company employ ces was 3.6 disabiling injuries per million man-hours worked, which is 73 per cent below similar rates for other industries. This is the first time the corporation as a whole has received the award, although individual UCC companies have won it.
