He has a major in psychology and an excellent background in music, according to church spokesmen, having been the director of the Baker University male quartet, soloist with the Baker University choir, and soloist for the First Methodist Church in Evanston. He also is a pianist.

Shelby and his mother, Mrs. Chelcia Shelby, will reside at 1612 Cota Ave. Before coming to Torrance, Mrs. Shelby was Clerk of a District Court in Kansas for ten years. Shelby is the brother of Mrs. Gordon Routh of Torrance.

Torrance has been the new churchman's home during the past two summers. He looks upon his work as quite a challenge if the church is to keep pace with the rapid growth of the City of Torrance. He also feels that this will be possible and has a very optimistic outlook on his future here.

Sunday Text For Church Announced

Spiritual understanding and love of God will meet the great need of all nations, says the Sunday Lesson—Sermon on "God" in all Christian Science churches.

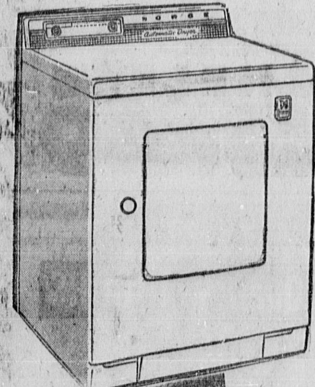
