At Lomita Park

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

## Original Songs, Dances Spark Closing Program

One hundred fifty Girl Scouts and Brownies ended Day Camp at Torrance Park Thursday and an additional 80 Brown les climaxed a similar 10-day activity at Lomita Park the samday with original programs demonstrating the work they had done during the sessions.

In addition to cooking their own meals and cleaning up

afterwards by a democratic lot-drawing to determine indi-vidual chores, the girls learned many outdoor skills, such as building camp equipment, making First Ald kits, and study-ing plants and trees in the two parks. A junior council gov-erning the groups met each day before lunchtime to evaluate the day's activities and determine succeeding routines.

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The Scouts put their imaginations to work creating costumes for the closing program. Each group's dance, skit, or song was original, evolved with the help of leaders and Senior Girl Scouts, who served as program aides.
