Car Bargains to End

A majority of officials in the automobile industry are agreed that the day of major discounts in the new-ear market will probably come to an end by the end of this year They expect retail dealers to order only as many 1955 models as they can sell, and not be caught with an over-supply of new cars.

Although the 1955 models will not be introduced until late in the year, retailers are already cutting down on their stocks of new cars. The all-time inventory high since the war was reached on May 1st of this year. At that time there were over 600,000 new cars in inventory.

Recent figures, however, show that this figure is steadily dening. A July 1st estimate was something over 500,000 new cars inventory, and it is generally agreed that, by August 1st, the tail will be below 500,000 for the first time since the end of last.

There is a difference of opinion whether prices will be cut on 1985 models, although the recent increase in the price of steel may have hurt chances for price cuts.

There is no doubt that the buying public has enjoyed the plight of retail automobile dealers immensely in the last ten months. It was the first time that dealers had become so overstocked since World War II, although there was a short period prior to the Korean War when new cars could sometimes be had on liberal trade-in allowances, or discounts.

24 Million Policyholders

Many Americans do not realize the tremendous increase in the insurance business which has occurred since the end of World r II. Recent figures show that life insurance in force climbed n \$122,000,000,000 in 1941 to \$304,000,000,000 at the beginning loss.

Moreover, the number of life insurance companies has increased by more than 300, and some 24,000,000 new policy-holders have been added to company lists.

It is now estimated that seventy-nine per cent of all families in this country own some type of life insurance and that seven per cent of these families, put ten per cent of their disposable income into insurance premiums.

Life insurance seems to be most popular in the State of Delaware, where insurance in force per family averages \$3,100. Consectiout ranks next, with \$8,200 and New Jersey third with \$8,000.

Mississippi families, meanwhile, have only \$2,400 on the average and Arkansas only \$2,700. In addition to the increase in life insurance, group insurance and all forms of insurance have increased sharply since World War II.

The rise in insurance reflects the rise in prosperity in the United States in the last thirteen years, and is a healthy condition for both the national economy and the insurance companies earning profits on this business. The most encouraging thing is the establishment of 300 new insurance companies, many of them in sections where insurance companies were a rarity only a few decades ago.



The Air Force has asked Congress for an initial appropriation of \$14,338,000 for its new academy, the counterpart of West Point and Annapolis, to be built near Colorado Springs, Colorado, Congress has already authorized an expenditure of \$26,000,000 during the current fiscal year, \$1,000,000 of it on a temporary academy to be occupied until the permanent one is ready. The temporary academy will probably be located at Lowry Field.

DISASTER RELIEF

The Federal Government has provided \$66,685,033, for flood, drought and other disaster relief to the states since Congress authorized the disaster relief program in 1951. A little more than half of this amount \$-\$55,694,704—was allocated to the Housing and Home Finance Agency for disaster relief prior to 1953. and \$50,988,329 to the Civil Defense administration for distribution, under the present system of coping with disasters.

RECORD HOME BUILDING
The Government predicts that on the basis of a new jump in the already b o o ming homebuilding industry, 1954 production of homes and apartment units placed under construction m. June totaled 120,000, a 12 per cent rise over May, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

WITHDRAWAL?
United States plans to withdraw almost all of its Army units from the Far East by 1967 have been revised by the Department of Defense after a reappraisal of the present Communist menace.

NO "MUNICH"
Under-Secretary of State Walter Bedell Smith, on his return to this country from Geneva, stated that while this country "does not like" some of the terms of the Indochina truce agreement, it was not "another Munich."

SMALL BUSINESS LOANS
The Small Business Administration recently announced that it has approved 524 business loans, totaling \$50,896,262 since it be gan taking applications from small companies last October. About 400 applications are being received by the SBA each month and about one-third of them are said to meet the agency's credit reulirements.

COST-OF-LIVING UP
An increase of four-tenths of one per cent in food prices between mild-May and mid-June caused the Consumer Price Index to go up one-tenth of one per cent, Rent showed no increase and four other categories remained stable.

COMMUNICATIONS

The Army has announced that it has developed a super-communications channel, superior to the coaxial cable. The channel can carry thirty or more television programs along the surface of a wire.

SOUTHEAST
ASIAN DEFENSE

The State Department has announced that plans are being arranged "through diplomatic channels in a number of capitals" for a conference of Western and Asian nations. The tentative plans call for a conference to begin consideration of a defensive alliance for Southeast Asian countries late in August or early in September, to be held possibly at Baguio, the summer capital of the Philippines.

The Eisenhower Administration ended its first full year in
office with a deficit of \$8,029000,000, or \$245,000,000 less than
the deficit forecast by Administration experts last January.

CHEAP ATOMIC FURNACE
The Atomic Energy Commission has set in motion a project
aimed at developing a new kind
of atomic furnace for the generation of cheap electric power.
The AEC has approved a \$10,000.000 project in which the
commission and North American Aviation, Inc., of Los Angeles, will work on the development of the nation's first
soditum-graphite reactor — an
atomic furnace that will use
stightly enriched uranium or a
combination of thorium and
U-233 as fuel. The experimental
furnace is due to be operating
by mid-1987.
