Here is Mrs. Popovich's recipe for APRICOT MERINGUE DAINTIES:
BOTTOM LAYER
Mix together thoroughly: ¼ cup soft butter or nucoa ½ cup of sifted confectioners sugar 2 egg yolks

1 cup of sifted flour

1 tbsp. fresh grated lemon rind

1 tsp. of fresh lemon julce

Press and flatten dough with rubber scraper or hand to cover bottom of ungreased 9x9 pan. Bale 10 minutes in 350 degree oven. Cool slightly and spread with ¾ cup of apricot jam, then with meringue toppling.

MERINGUE TOPPING

Beat until stiff . . . 2 egg whites
Beat in gradually . . . % cup sugar
Fold in 1 cup ground walnuts

Return to oven and bake 20 minutes more. Cool slightly and cut into small diamond shapes.

HIGHLY CRITICAL PERSON FEARFUL

The highly critical individual usually projects his own fears and doubts upon those about him; in this way he diverts attention from himself and his problems. He is just as afraid of his own feelings as some of the other types we have discussed; the difference lies in the mechanism of projection.

WANT TO CHANGE OTHERS

Most of these people are usually hypersensitive to criticism themselves, which also is a defense or protective measure from facing their own feelings. It is an easy thing for this type of individual, if he is highly aggressive in addition, to be extremely belligerent, eager to have people change or to make changes in them.

The individual with a lower aggressive nature will often develop into the nagging type of criticalness. Notther is conducive to good human relations, of course.

CRITICAL PERSONS NOT LIKED

Critical persons are generally not liked. They often make themselves offensive, then feel rejected when people respond unfavorably to them.

There are generally two types of criticism, one of what we are doing; the other of our ability and attitudes.

For example, a person sees ways in which we may be doing a thing that may actually be contributing to the failure of a project, and he points this out, at the same time explaining the better way to do it. Very often it is quite easy for us to accept this type of what we may call constructive criticism.

There are others, however, who expect for us, to characterists.

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There are others, however, who expect for us to change our way without offering us anything in the way of improvement, "Just do it the other way because I think it's better" very often produces resentment on our part, quite naturally, since it is rooted in the desire, we think, to reject our way rather than to help us do it better.

The second type of criticism, that of our own personality and attitudes, is less concrete and even more dependent upon the others" "idea" of what is right or wrong, good or bad. As such, being more abstract, it is perhaps much easier for us to resist, since most of us resent being "changed."

Watch the overly critical individual. See if he isn't trying to keep others from seeing his mistakes, his need "to change" by focusing the attention upon them instead. Destructive criticism is that which seems to be pointless, that in which the sole aim seems to be to tear down rather than to build up, in which there is a great amount of ego satisfaction taken in the act of criticizing iself, and especially when the individual offers no better way of improving or handling the situation.

We all need at times to be able to the constructive.

HELP OTHERS TO BE THEMSELVES

Let us not avoid our own problems by projecting them upon others and thereby avoid our own inadequacies. Let's help others to be themselves instead of trying to make them over at every turn. This is so important, especially in family relationships.
