There is a degree of critical ability which is necessary for the healthy personality and balanced temperament. As we have pointed out, it is valuable and helpful at times to give constructive criticism as well as to be able to accept it gracefully.

### DISCRIMINATION A MUST

Critical ability in this sense would encompass the ability to select, to weigh, to examine; it would include a sense of discrimination on our part. All of this is necessary in order to make wise choices and intelligent decisions.

Again, we say it is at times to our advantage to find flaws in an argument, a business deal, an article, etc.; yet this does not mean tearing it to pieces or picking it apart as the expression goes.

### NEED FOR APPRECIATION

Appreciation seems to be a basic need within man. We all need to feel appreciated by those about us, especially those who love us. In addition, we need to be able to give appreciation to these persons. This is the healthy situation—to be able to freely give and receive appreciation.

So many persons actually are unable to receive a compliment without feeling unworthy. They are apt to make some such statement as "oh, it's not really so good," etc. Some persons become embarrassed or flustered in some fashion or another. Very few individuals will look you straight in the eyes with a smile of acceptance and say simply: "Thank you, I'm glad you like it" or the equivalent.

Try giving compliments which involve appreciation in one form or another this next week and see how many are gracefully received.
