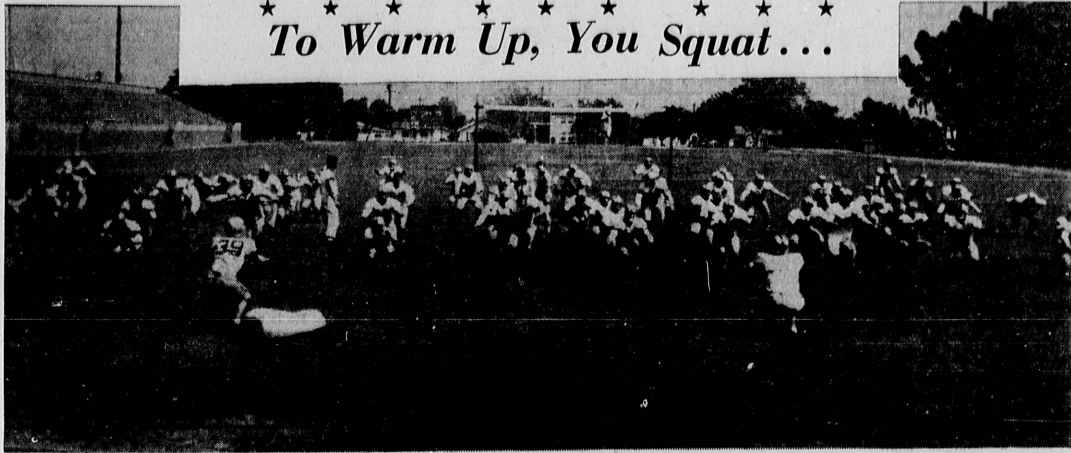


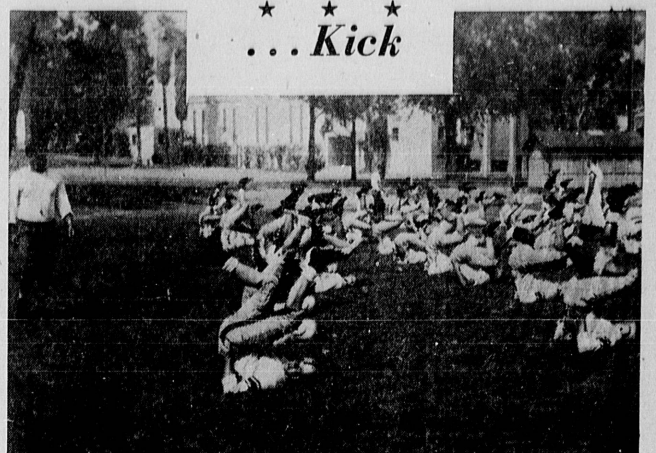

Seventy-three aspirants for the Torrance High School pigskin team today entered their second week of learning that there's more to football than letterman sweaters, bright lights and feminine sighs.

The raw material for the '54 Tartar turf machine was split into teams Saturday and pounded heads in the first scrimmage of the year. A full-scale game scrimmage will be staged this Saturday on Tartar field where Coaches Cliff Graybehl and Dick Leech will begin a serious process of separating the quick and the dead.

First casualty of the young season was Gerald Wilkins, who sprained his ankle when he stepped into a pothole on the field. The hole, which should be covered, is just one of many outlets for the field's sprinkler system—all bare.

Wilkins impresses mightily in his brief showing. A fourth stringer last year, Wilkins is called "one of the best guards I've got," by Graybehl.

Graybehl's brow is creased over shortages at the center spot and lack of depth at end, where things become dim after Dennis Hester, Bob Boss and Bob Hanks. A Bee end who might fight his way in is Don Iwata.

Among the 11 returning lettermen, Tom Vanderpool and Manny Oloque, tackles, and ends Boss and Hester look "real good" in the line, according to the Coach.

In the backfield, all that is lacking is depth. Leech has five front-line backs that will rank with the best in the league this year in Skip Smith, Sonny Steele, Jerry Burns, Don Frattarole and Bob Wilson, a converted guard. Steele will mastermind the team from the tailback spot in the Tartar single wing and behind him is Billy Moacham, a pinpoint passer. A steamroller variety of running power has been unveiled in practice by fullback Smith, a junior, and it takes something akin to a concrete wall to stop this lad once he gets rolling.

Speed will be provided by fleet Burns, at half, with Jim Donnette in reserve and Wilson could provide a real surprise in his first shot at carrying the skin. Leading the way for this array of swinepackers will be blocking back Frattarole, who is fast, wide and hits hard.

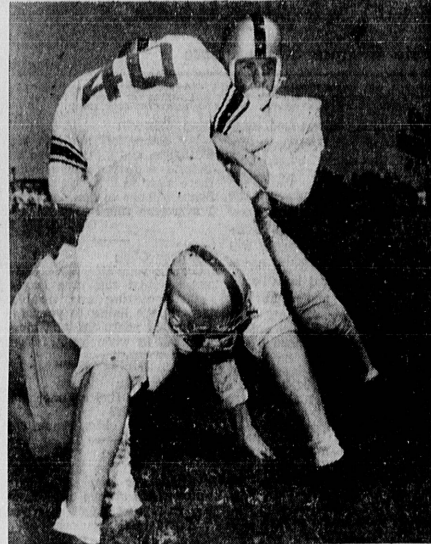

PACIFIC COAST LITTLE LEAGUE TO BE FORMED
