

Bluebirds Drop 8-6 Ball Game To Coaster Nine

A three run rally in the eighth and another tally in the ninth by the L.A. Coasters broke the backs of the Torrance Bluebirds, Sunday afternoon, as they dropped their first game in many weeks by an 8-6 score.

The Birds apparently had it in the bag going into the eighth, with a 6-4 lead. The runs for the locals were all earned on good bingles, sparked by a homer in the fifth by pitcher Billy Joe Waters. His hop sent Claire Johnson heading for home, after Claire bluffed a single to get on first.

Johnson, French Score Swain Johnson and Jack French, in the second, each got singles, and later scored. Johnson and French tripped home on a two-bagger slugged by Tex Roberts.

A home run in the same stanza for the Coasters brought in A. Brewer, the batter, and S. Butler, who just had gotten to first on a 4-ball count.

Both teams went scoreless in the third and fourth innings, with Hank Camou left standing on third, and French on second in the third and fourth, respectively.

Hank Camou snagged two Coaster fly offerings in the third, to end a threat. Runners were on first and second, with one away.

Break Torrance Lead

The winners broke up the locals' lead in the eighth after F. Joshua blasted a double, Brewer made it to first on an error. E. Joshua tripped to first on a bobble, and A. Lewis got on, also on an error, bringing home a run.

Another error, and a base hit pounded in enough tallies to put the visitors in the lead. Outfielder N. Nickson slammed a three-baser in the final stanza for the clincher.

Waters replaced A. Bishop at the hurler's mound in the fifth for Torrance.

Notice is hereby given that sealed proposals will be received up to 9 o'clock a.m. of October 19, 1954 by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles, State of California, in its office at Room 501 Hall of Records, in the City of Los Angeles, for the purchase of the following described bonds of Torrance Unified School District of the par value of One Million Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,400,000.00). Each of said bonds will be dated November 1, 1954, and will bear interest at a rate not to exceed five per cent (5%) per annum, which shall be in multiples of one-fourth (1/4) of one per cent (1/4%), which rate of interest shall be determined upon the sale. The interest for the first year shall be payable on one installment at the end of said year, and all interest thereafter shall be payable semiannually, both principal and interest to be payable in lawful money of the United States, or in the County of Los Angeles, or at any of the fiscal agencies of the County of Los Angeles in the City of Los Angeles, State of New York, or in the City of Chicago, State of Illinois, at the option of the holders. Torrance Unified School District has been acting as a unified school district under the laws of the State of California continuously since January 24, 1947.

The assessed valuation of the taxable property in said unified school district for the fiscal year 1954-55 is \$5,826,800.00, and the amount of bonds previously issued and outstanding as of September 8, 1954, is \$5,240,000.00. Torrance Unified School District includes an area of approximately 12.25 square miles, and the estimated population of said unified school district is 67,850. The bonds will be sold for cash only and at not less than par and accrued interest.

Each bid must state that the bidder offers par and accrued interest to the date of delivery, and state separately the premium, if any, and the rate of interest offered for the bonds bid for. Each bid will be accepted if the bidder, in accordance with the terms of his bid, and said check shall remain in the possession of the Board of Supervisors until all of said bonds are paid for. The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids. The Board also reserves the right to disregard insubstantial irregularities and technical defects in bids.

At the time of payment for and delivery of the bonds the County will furnish the buyer or its agent a certificate that there is no litigation pending affecting the validity of the bonds.
