Students figure their own income taxes, the cost of making various objects, or batting averages of ball players as a part of this program, he said. Mrs. Wright also pointed out some of the problems which face the school board—primarily that of a mushrooming population, which comes in faster than the school district can provide adequate facilities for the children.
