Us standard pastry recipe
1 cup sugar
½ cup butter or shortening (1 cube)
2 eggs
1 cup raisins
1 cup nutmeats (chopped medium)
1 tsp. vanilla
Roll out pastry and cut in rounds and line muffin tin Roll out pastry and cut in rounds and line muffin tin cups allowing surplus pastry to make fluted edge. Chill well. Cream butter or shortening with sugar, add eggs and mix thoroughly. Add raisins, nuts and vanilla and fill pastry cups. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 375 for 15-20 minutes. Slower baking makes filling thick and custard-like. This makes, 10 to 12 chess pies according to size of pan. The pies may be served warm or cold and do not need a topping. They can be kept for several days if family does not discover where they are hidden.
