Job Seekers Up During January, Officials Report

Unemployment in Torrance rose about nine per cent during January, according to figures released by the local office of the Department of Employ-

ment.
On Feb. 1, 970 job applicants
were on file, compared with
886 the previous month. Of the
totals, 565 applicants were men,
while 405 women sought jobs,
Forty-three per cent of the men
were veterans.

The number of unemploye laborers showed a marke drop, from 212 to 176, but skill ed workers increased from 18 to 229, clerical help from 14 to 169, and professional workers from 19 to 37.
