Miss Maloy will have two more meetings, May 3 and her farewell night, May 17. On June 4 Sally Speck will be installed as honored queen.

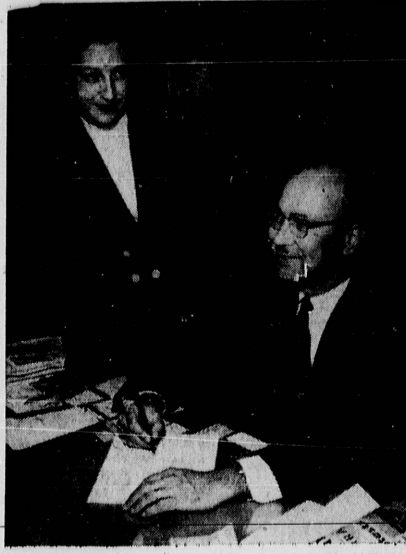
## Guild Meeting Set for May 16
