International Theme

Theme of this five-day gathering starting Sunday, of business and professional executives—who represent 8,700 Clubs with a membership of 411,000 in 90 countries and geographical regions—is the internationality of the Rotary organization. Throughout the convention program, emphasis will be given to the opportunities Rotarians have, in all parts of the world, to work for the achievement of one of the principal goals of Rotary—the advancement of international understanding, good will and peace.

The convention program includes addresses by outstanding speakers, discussion forums, election of officers, and special entertainment features. Rotarians also will study the common problems of their businesses and professions and the many community-betterment activities engaged in.

Among the scheduled speakers are Richard M. Nixon, vice-president of the U.S.; Lester B. Pearson, secretary of state for external affairs, Dominion of Canada; Sir Leslie Munro, New Zealand ambassador to the U. S. A.; Hon. William G. Stratton, governor of Illinois; Richard J. Daley mayor of Chicago; Paul Hoffman, chairman of the board of Packard-Studebaker Corp.; Sujono Surjotjondro, counselor of the Indonesian Embassy.

What to Do With Trash Hot Discussion Topic in LA Now

Private rubbish collectors Thursday offered to provide city-wide residential trash pick-up service by July 1 for a monthly fee of \$1 per home.

The proposal was submitted to the public works committee of the Los Angeles City Council by Erwin Bucksban, chairman of a committee representing organized and independent refuse contractors.

"We are prepared to put 1000 modern trucks into immediate service under strict city control, with every operator posting a \$5000 bond to guarantee his faithful compliance with service fees and pick-up schedules," Bucksban told the committee.

Pay-Off Charged

Meanwhile, a Superior Court civil action charged some private collectors were assessed for a "pay-off" fund "to be spent where it would do the most good" in order to prevent adoption of a municipal collection system in Los Angeles was filed.

Attorney Findlay Carter who filed the charge, alleged that officers of the State Rubbish Collectors Assn. and Local 390 of the Teamsters Union conspired to monopolize the rubbish collection business in violation of the state's Cartwright anti-trust law.

"This private system will not cost the public one cent of tax money. It will save the city the millions of dollars it would cost to establish and maintain a municipal system," Bucksban said.

Experiment Eliminated

"It will eliminate the need for a costly fact-finding pilot experiment in the Harbor area. It will prevent the creation of a monopoly by outside hoodlums said to be contemplating an invasion of the city."

"It will guarantee adequate service to every household at equitable rates, with a one-week pick-up of 50 gallons or 80 pounds for only \$1 a month."

Bucksban recommended that the industry be "under strict city control, regulation and supervision" that refuse truck license and permit fees be raised from \$24 to \$100 per year, and that the surety bond be required as a guarantee of "faithful performance" by every operator.

Councilman Everett G. Burkhalter, chairman of the committee, said the plan would receive "careful study."

Twenty per cent of all money taken in by the boys will return to local troops for their own use. The Scout-O-Rama will feature displays of all types of Boy Scout work.
