

Stars Survive Rally, Deal Seals First Defeat in Babe Ruth Play

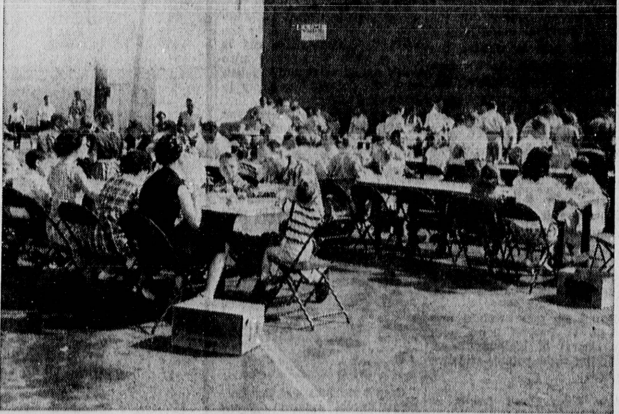
