Construction will start soon on a \$200,000 wholesale and retail facility, with general offices, for Roth's Markets, Inc., at \$10,000,000 Crenshaw Industrial Tract in Hawthorne, Realtor John B. Kilroy, tract developer and sole sales agent, announced Friday.

Completion is expected September 1, he said.

The new 23,000 square foot building will be of pre-cast, reinforced concrete, tilt-up construction, with tapered steel girders and complete roof fire-sprinkler installation. It will be an addition to the 28-year old market chain's present facilities, and will have attractive general offices at the front of the building.

The new headquarters will enable Roth's Markets, Inc., to keep pace with expanding business, and to service newly opened markets, stated Ben Roth, president of the concern. Completion of the Roth building near Crenshaw and El Segundo Blvds., Kilroy said, will mark the 28th building to be erected in the 60-acre, planned Crenshaw Industrial Tract.

The building will have a brick facade, with a parking area, landscaping, generous black top parking areas and adequate paved access streets, it was stated.
