MEETING YOUR CHILD'S NEEDS

As we have already discussed, your child's needs are fourfold... the physical and emotional we have covered. Today we want to highlight the mental. Your child's mental needs include the drive to explore and to investigate his environments thereby learning about the world he lives in. The aware and alert child is one who learns more rapidly, understands situations more easily, is able to adapt a creative and resourceful attitude in meeting a challenging situation. A child must have the opportunities to use his resourcefulness to develop his awarement, he needs to it allowed to make decisions within his ability to do so in order to mature in his sense of responsibility. A chance to plan with the family, work in a democratic and cooperative manner all enables this to take place through the years.

NEW EXPERIENCES. AND GROWTH

Opportunities for new experiences are a need for both child and adult. Each one needs the stimulation and quickening of the mental processes that this provides. The average child is usually eager to reach into a new situation, curious to find out as much about it as he can. Why is it that way, who made it, how does it work, are all such a familiar questions to every parent. The child's incessant questioning helps him to find out why, helps to aid in his growth and the maturation of his mental processes.

FEAR BLOCKS GROWTH

Contrary to popular belief, it is often the child who is more alert and alive to life situation than the adults around him. He more than likely "learns" fearfulness and withdrawal through too many don'ts, stops and can'ts. A new baby has two fears established, fear of falling and of loud noises. The average adult's fears are innumerable. How wonderful if we could teach him about life without fear, to help him to know and understand his environment. Fear blocks his learning processes and creates unnecessary tensions.


