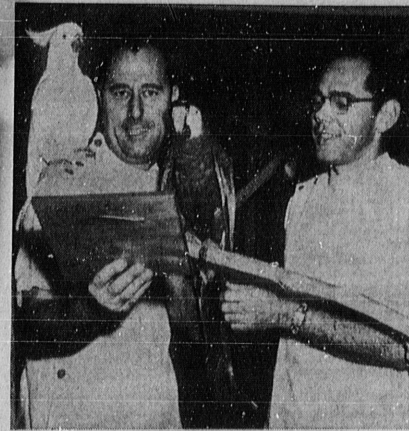

Local Industries to Tell Progress in Smog Battles

Industry will explain its progress toward smog control and the techniques it is developing at the first Southern California Conference on the Elimination of Air Pollution, Nov. 10, in Los Angeles.

Attempt Entry Of Local Firm

Detectives are investigating an attempted burglary as a result of illegal entry of the Aircraft Maintenance System, at 2107 Border Ave., and attempted break-in to the Vend-A-Park Corp., next door at 2105 Border, Wednesday night.

The role of industry will feature the afternoon session of the Conference at the Ambassador Hotel. Morning sessions beginning at 9:30 will be devoted to federal, state, and county presentations on what has been done about smog, what is being done and what will be done.

The Conference is being arranged by the California State Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors, the Air Pollution Foundation, and the Los Angeles County Air Pollution Control District.

Presiding over the afternoon forum on "What Is Industry Doing?" will be Dr. W. Ballentine Henley, president of the Rotary Club of Los Angeles.

First speaker will be a representative of the oil industry, Philip S. Magruder, executive vice president of General Petroleum Corp. and chairman of the air pollution control committee of the Western Oil and Gas Assn.

Commenting on the meeting, Magruder said, "It is encouraging to us that we can sit down with government, the scientists, and the press, and tell exactly what has and will be done about smog."

"As the representative of the oil industry, I can not over-emphasize the importance of the need for this type of conference, for the community is brought up to date and given the facts about this critical problem which affects us all."
