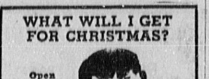
The dinner will be held from 3 to 10 p.m. under the auspices of the Redondo Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Messiah Practice To Start Sunday

Rehearsals for Handel's "Messiah," to be presented at the First Lutheran Church, 2900 W. Carson St., on Dec. 4, will begin this Sunday, according to Fred Lincoln, Jr., area manager. Choir members of churches in the Torrance-Lomita area, and persons familiar with the work, will participate in the presentation under the direction of Frank Owen, organist and choir-master at St. Paul's Cathedral, Los Angeles.

This will mark the second annual presentation of Handel's famous oratorio here, and will be one of 65 presentations through the area, under sponsorship of the Church Federation of Los Angeles and the Southern California Council of Protestant Churches.

Auditions have already been held in Los Angeles to pick the soloists, four of whom will appear at 4 p.m., and will be open to the public at no charge.

"The date well ahead of Christmas was selected in order that the presentation of the Messiah in so many different places at once throughout the Southland will signify the beginning of the Advent season," said Dr. Forrest C. Weir, executive director of the Church Federation of Los Angeles.

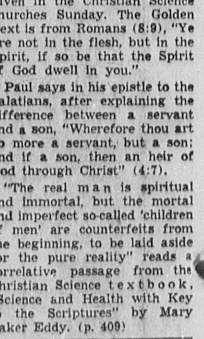
