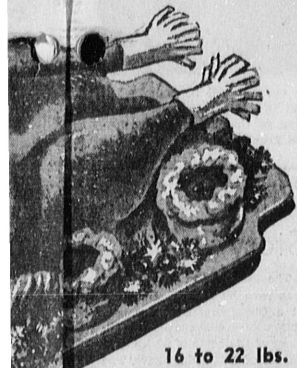

Board Gives Approval to School Plans

Approval of the site layout and preliminary drawings for Edison School and multipurpose units at Perry, Carr, Hillside, and Wood Schools was voted by the Torrance School Board, Tuesday night, along with a site layout for West Torrance School.

Architect Roy Donley's plans for Edison School, 182nd and Doty Ave., got tentative approval Tuesday night. The preliminary drawings show a compact square of buildings surrounding a court, with a multipurpose building included.

For Hillside, Carr, and Wood Schools, the same general type of plans will be used, according to plans presented by Neptune and Thomas. At Perry School, a wooden building built in 1894 and condemned last year as a fire hazard will be razed to make room for the administration and multipurpose units.

Tentative approval also was given to the site layout for West Torrance School, Hallison and Flavian Aves. Plans were prepared by Bowen, Rule, and Bowen.

School Calendar Under Study by Education Board

Under consideration by the Los Angeles Board of Education this week is the adoption of a school calendar for the forthcoming 1956-57 school year, it was announced by Superintendent of Schools Claude L. Reeves.

Submitted to the Board last week, the tentative proposed calendar calls for a 200-day school year. School would start on Monday, Sept. 17 and run through Friday, June 21, 1957.

Torrance area schools would include Narbonne High School and Halldale, Carson, Dolores, and 186th St. schools. A total of 180 actual teaching days are provided for by this calendar, with the remaining 20 days being taken up by seven legal holidays and 13 school holidays.

Days when schools will close by State law are Veterans' Day, Nov. 12; Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 22; Christmas Day, Dec. 25; New Year's Day, Jan. 1; Lincoln's Birthday, Feb. 12; Washington's Birthday, Feb. 22; and Memorial Day, May 30.

School holidays fall on Nov. 23, day after Thanksgiving; Dec. 20 through Jan. 1, for Christmas vacation; and April 15 through 19 for Easter vacation.

Members of the Board of Education will hear opinions from employe and community groups through the month of January.

For First City Directory Since 1949

Canvassers Start Taking Names

Canvassing began this week to get the names of all persons living in Torrance for inclusion in a city directory to be published next spring.

The Luskey Brothers & Co., Santa Ana, began collecting data for the first city directory to be published here since 1949. All persons over 20 now living in the city will be included in the directory.

About 25 canvassers will be knocking on local doors during the next three months to find out the names, addresses, occupations, and phone numbers of local citizens.

Directory Benefits

"It is our intention to put out the best city directory that Torrance has ever had," said Don De Cheney, who is directing the canvass. "Families listing in it will better insure delivery of mail, parcels, telegrams, and will help themselves get local credit references, proof of residence for police and fire protection, voting privileges, and other benefits."

Included in the directory will be:

1. An alphabetical list of all residents over 20 years old, with home addresses, occupations, employment connections, wives' names, and telephone numbers. Businesses, professions, and organizations also will be listed alphabetically.
2. A criss-cross street section, listing householders and businesses by street address. Property ownership and telephone numbers also will be shown. Every street address,

even if unoccupied, will be accounted for in the directory.

3. A criss-cross telephone guide, listing numbers numerically, with the names of persons who have them.

4. A classified section of businesses, professions, churches and other organizations.

Regular Check Planned

The firm, which has published directories in Pomona, Las Vegas, San Bernardino, Riverside, Lynwood, Santa Ana, and other places, hopes to publish a directory here every two years, De Cheney said.

The city directory program was endorsed by the Chamber of Commerce board of directors after studying the operation of the firm.

At least 15,000 copies of the householders' directory will be distributed free to local homes.
