BRANDIED CHEESE SPREAD

- 2-3-oz. pkgs. cream cheese
- 3-1 1/2-oz. imported roquefort cheese
- 1 tsp. dry mustard
- 2 tsp. olive oil
- 3 tsp. brandy

Let the cream cheese soften to room temperature. Beat until fluffy. Crumble roquefort cheese into cream cheese. Add olive oil, beat well. Stir in mustard and brandy. Keep in refrigerator until ready to use. This mixture can be kept for several weeks.
