This is the second of a series of concerts sponsored by the Youth and Artist Concerts Assn. Other concerts are scheduled for April 10, with Clarence Turner as soloist, and May 23, with the four student scholarship winners as soloists. Admission to these concerts is by season ticket, however, a few seats are available for those desiring to attend only individual performances.

'Motel of Stars' Set for Construction in Anaheim

Ground breaking ceremonies will be staged next Wednesday for the 300-room Motel of the Stars, which will be located near Disneyland in booming Anaheim.

The motel, which will consist of some 1900 units, will be the first in a chain of motels in tourist centers throughout the country constructed by Motel of the Stars, Inc. It is scheduled to be ready for occupancy by July.

One million shares of stock in the motel now are on sale to the public at \$3 a share, announced J. D. Cregor, manager of E. H. Hansen and Co., a Whittier investment firm. Persons wishing to obtain more information on purchase of stock may inquire at the E. H. Hansen and Co. office, 124 N. Bright Ave., Whittier.

Swimming Pool
 Elaborate plans for the motel include construction of a swimming pool and other sports facilities on a 23 acre plot. John Kuhns, president of Motel of the Stars, Inc., stated.

The new structure will be constructed on the southwest corner of Walnut and Cerritos in Anaheim.

Other innovations listed by Kuhns include portable kitchens in every room, where a ring for a beauty will bring an unending variety of foods. "The Sky Roof," a bar, first commercial use of solar heating principle for the swimming pool, and tours of Disneyland for adults and children alike. Youngsters

may be left on chaperoned parties, while their parents take in other activities.

Stars Are Shareholders
 "Although we are calling the establishment a motel," Kuhns said, "it hardly will be recognized as such in the usual sense, since we are planning to include elaborate innovations which will combine all the advantages of hotel life with the leisurely living of the modern day motel."
