Youths Manage Steel Company

You won't find their stock listed on the stock exchange nor with any of the securities and commodities exchanges, but 24 new companies have been formed in the Torrance area during the past few months and predictions are that each will be a thumping success.

The two dozen fledgling firms are part of the nationwide Junior Achievement program which last week observed National Junior Achievement Week.

Purpose of the program is to provide youngsters between the ages of 15 and 19 an extensive education in the American free enterprise system. And the youths are learning the hard way — by doing.

Some 350 students from eight high schools in the area have established companies and are now experiencing the joys and headaches — that come with operating a corporation.

Issue Stock

They issue stock, elect officers, manufacture and sell products, keep books, handle payrolls, make reports to stockholders and declare dividends and bonuses — if any. All J. A. companies are dissolved at the end of the school year, and new ones are formed when classes resume in the fall.

The program in this area is under the auspices of the Hawthorne Center of Junior Achievement of Los Angeles, Inc. Approximately 700 boys

and girls from 16 high schools operate 50 J. A. companies in the county.

Products produced range from oxcart planters and carving boards to steel bookracks.

Jasco Corp

One thriving J. A. Company of the Hawthorne Center is the Jasco Products Corporation, conceived by the Torrance Works of the Columbia-Geneva Steel Division of United States Steel Corporation.

Production is in full swing at Jasco in the manufacture of steel bookracks. The racks are made from steel purchased at the Torrance Works. Jasco orders the steel the same as any other customer of U. S. Steel and pays for it out of money raised through stock issues until sales from products start coming in.
