### **Dump Permit** Gets Year's Extension

The County Sanitation Districts got a one-year extension of a permit to operate a big county dump in the south Torrance-Rolling Hills area from the County Regional Planning Commission last week.

the County Regional Planning Commission last week.

The use permit for the dump expired Dec. 6, but last week's action extended it for a year. Officials of the sanitation district said the cut-and-cover operation on bth sides of Crenshaw Blvd. north of Palos Verdes Dr. N. will begin early next spring "as originally planned."

The dump will receive rubbish from a wide area as part of an area-wide anti-smog plan. Eventually, it will be used as a park.

In other action, the Regional Planners approved a 41-home tract proposed by Subdivider George S. Denbo on 26 acres south of Palos Verdes Dr. N., east of Crenshaw. They also gave a green light to a 436-home development on 118 acres southeast of Montemalaga Dr. and Granvia Altamira. Grandview Building Co. is the subdivider.

The Commission also recommended a change in zoning on 155 lots in two new subdivisions just northwest of Crenshaw Blvd. and Palos Verdes Dr. South. The change is from a requirement of 3000 to 10,000 square feet on single family residences.
