Larry Wright stood as best man and the Rev. Walter Graham officiated at the marriage.

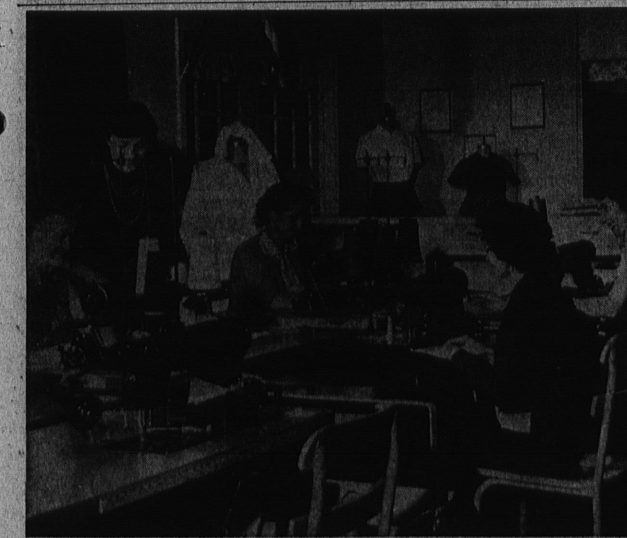
A reception followed and the couple left for Big Bear on a honeymoon. They are now at home at 838 W. 3rd St. San Pedro.
