Be-fore that, for thousands of years, it was the high road of conquest for Genghis Khan, Sennacherib, Alexander the Great, the Caesars, Napoleon, and a less important mixture of greedy and unprincipled despots.

Today, in addition to the basic inherent problems of religious hatreds, hunger, hopelessness, exploitation, il-literacy, we find two new ele-ments which add to the chaos and uncertainty: The estab-lishment of the State of Is-rael; and the entry of the So-viet Union into Middle East-ern affairs to fill the vacuum created by the decline of British and French power. π

created by the decline of British and French power. π π π Our proposals on the Mid-die East tend to deal only with temporary measures, with relatively small dollar grants and relatively risky and dangerous military com-mitments. President Eisen-nower's plan for the Middle East is a starter, but like our previous plans is only sooth-ing oil for a deep rooted ma-lignancy of complicated prog-nosis. Present UN interven-tion is also a temporary meas-ure to neutralize the unfor-tunate attack upon E g y p t. The real danger is apparent in the present vacuum which finds some 50,000,000 Ber-bers, Copts, Kurds, etc., who speak the common language of A ra bic, who find them-selves like the ir forebears hungry, hopeless, r e st iv e, and natural targets for the demagoguery of fanatical na-tionalists. Add to this the Arab-He-

tionalists and comparatives. Communists. Add to this the Arab-He-brew hostility and you have elements that poison the prospects for peace and sta-bility. Any attempt to solve them with millitary means, by arousing the Arab states to arm against Soviet aggression, will, in our opin-ion, fail. The United Nations should be utilized as an inter-mational influence in prefer-ence to unilaterial assistance from the United States. The Arab state's prefer to consider both the Unit ed State and Russia from a neu-tral point of view in prefer-ence to taking sides. This is the best bargaining position for them whether we like it or ont. They will do business with us if we outbid other offers from any quarter. This is the basis of U. S. success and influence in the Middle East, as against power-pol-tics and bribes, and because of the Arabs prefer to do business with us. Our reluc-tance to mix politics with business has impressed the Middle East aft er its long and disappointing experi-... which results in the lack of food.
