Schools Plan 177-Day Term In 1957-58

Torrance school children won't get Washington's Birthday off next year. It falls on a Saturday.

In adopting the school calendar for the 1957-58 school year, the Torrance Board of Education set up a 177-day schedule, two days more than the 175 required by law.

Classes will open on Thursday, Sept. 12, and close on Friday, June 13, 1958. A three-day teachers' institute will precede the opening of school, starting on Sept. 9.

Students will get two days off for Thanksgiving and 10 days at Christmas, from Dec. 20 to Jan. 6. Spring vacation will be from March 31 to April 7, 1958. Single holidays include Veterans' Day, Lincoln's Birthday, and Memorial Day.
