## 'Man' Named Sermon Topic This Sunday

Permanent health and happiness — gained through the spiritual understanding of man's relationship to God — will be stressed in the Sunday services in all Christian Science churches.

Keynoting the Lesson-Sermon on "Man" is the Golden Text from Romans (8:16): "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God."

In "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" Mary Baker Eddy, the discoverer and founder of Christian Science, affirms, "Inasmuch as God is good and the fount of all being. He does not produce moral or physical deformity; therefore such deformity is not real, but is illusion, the mirage of error. Divine Science reveals these grand facts. ## Dr. Haley to Present Talk Wednesday

M. I. Haley, M.D., Ph.D., member of American Chemical Society and professor of biochemistry at College of Medical Evangelists presents the subject "Foods for Energy" next Wednesday evening, at the Torrance Civic Auditorium at 7:30 p.m.
