PV Riviera Group Favors Barricades

Keep the barricades! That was the word from the Palos Verdes Riviera Homeowners Assn., as the group unanimously passed a resolution at its Wednesday night meeting, urging that the iron barricades between Torrance and Palos Verdes be left right where they are. The residents declared that they didn't want Palos Verdes traffic coming down Calle de Arboles in their newly-opened tract.

Removal Asked
Their action is in direct opposition to many Hollywood Riviera homeowners' wishes, since they have frequently requested that the iron posts which bar all streets between Torrance and Palos Verdes except for two major thoroughfares, be removed.

The Palos Verdes Riviera Homeowners indicated that they had only one objection to the posts—they need painting. The barricades, first erected in 1949, have had much of the paint chipped off and are now a mixture of rusty and dirty gray.

"I wish that they would make the barricades higher," declared Mrs. Dorothy Thomas, 4905 Calle de Arboles. "I don't want all that traffic coming down our street. We have enough as it is."

Problem Aired
The barricade problem was aired recently on Radiocaster Bob Ferris' program.

HERALD columnist Jack Webb has led a battle against the barricades, terming them "un-American." He cited the fact that a Riviera woman, Mrs. Gary Ford, had nearly died after an ambulance was

prevented from reaching her after being blocked by the barricades.

Since they were first erected in 1949, the "iron curtain" has been a source of contention between Palos Verdes Estates and Torrance, with local city officials threatening at one time to make "road repairs" on Palos Verdes Blvd., cutting off that entrance to Palos Verdes Estates.

Educational Exhibit Set At El Camino

Tentative plans for an educational exhibit by the Industrial Arts Department of El Camino College on May 10, 11, and 12 were announced Friday by Theodore A. Thomas, heading the committee on arrangements.

Following the plan of last year, most of the exhibits will be located in the Campus Center for the convenience of guests, though some of the laboratory rooms and shops will be open for inspection by the public.

Thomas, drafting instructor and counselor, reported that present plans include displays of drawings by the drafting classes and demonstrations and tests by the Electronic and Radio Department. 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000 square feet of buildings. Cost of the center, including buildings, fixtures, and land, will be approximately \$40,000,000. Annual sales in excess of \$65,000,000 are expected by developers at the center.

The new center will be a prototype for future shopping centers, according to the store officials, because it will mark the first time in this area that two large, complete department stores, namely The Broadway and Sears, will be an integral part of a single project.

To Give Details
Coldwell-Banker & Co. negotiated the transactions among the three firms. Myron Wasson, principal agent of Coldwell-Banker in the matter, will present details of the development at the Chamber of Commerce breakfast at the YWCA building at 7:30, Tuesday.

The Broadway will construct a three-story building which is now being designed by Welton Becket, FAIA, and Associates.

One-Level Sears
Stiles Clements, architect for Sears, is planning a main store on one level plus a basement with a separate garden shop and automobile service station.

The balance of the center will be developed by Del Amo Estate Co., according to Wasson of Coldwell-Banker. Welton Becket and Associates will project architects on that phase of the program also.

Site preparation is expected to start soon, although actual construction of the two major stores can not be started until architects complete the detailed plans.

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occurred in this suggestion. Some cooperative cost arrangement might be worked out for the auditorium, Gold suggested.

DOG RABIES CLINIC SET ON FRIDAY

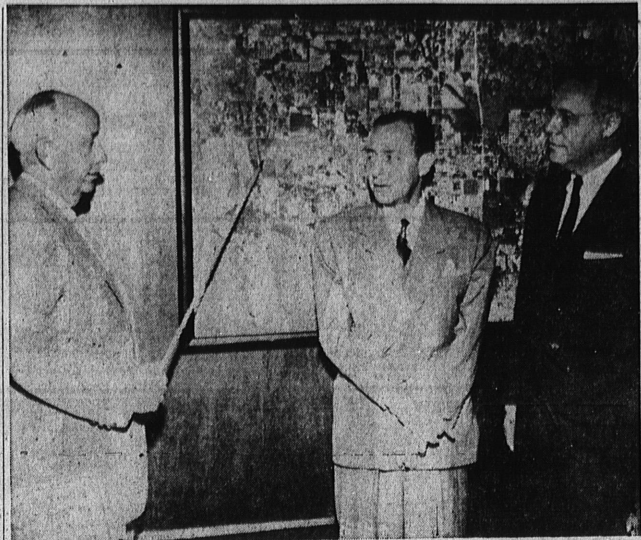
Rabies clinics for dogs will be held at three Torrance parks from 7 to 9 p.m., Friday night, according to Francis Fallon, director of the South Bay Humane Society.

Fallon reminded local dog owners that nearly two years has passed since the passage of Torrance's dog rabies inoculation ordinance and the serum is good only for two years. The clinics will be held at El Retiro, Torrance, and McMaster Parks, he said. The shots will cost \$1.50, and will be administered by local veterinarians. This will be the last clinic of the year.

The city requires all dogs over six months old to be inoculated against rabies before a license is issued for them. All dogs over three months old must have licenses.

"According to our estimates, there are about 1200 dogs in this area which do not have licenses or rabies shots," Fallon said. "The owners will be prosecuted if this is not taken care of."
