WOMEN SUPERIOR TO MEN, DECLARES ANTHROPOLOGIST

"It is the function of women to teach men how to be human," declared Dr. Ashley Montagu, speaking on the subject of "The Natural Superiority of Women" at El Camino College Tuesday evening.

"The world is suffering from an insufficiency of humanity and that there are more geniuses for being human among women than there have been among men, almost

who can teach this better than anyone else. Women love the whole human race; men are, on the whole, hostile to it.

"Men act as if they haven't been adequately loved, as if they had been frustrated and rendered hostile, and becoming aggressive, they say that aggressiveness is natural, and women inferior in this respect because they tend to be gentle and unaggressive!"

But it is precisely in this capacity to love and be unaggressive that the superiority of women to men is demonstrated, so far as the human species is concerned. Its very survival is more closely tied to this capacity for love and cooperation than any other, according to the speaker.

The female is superior in virtually all respects whatsoever to the male and this applies to the female of every species, Dr. Montagu finds as a result of his work as a research scientist. He has been professor of anatomy for almost 20 years, first at New York University and later at the Hahnemann Medical College and Hospital in Philadelphia. Earning his doctorate in anthropology at Columbia University, he has been chairman of the department of anthropology at Rutgers University, distinguished visiting professor at the University of Delaware, Bode lecturer at Ohio State University, and a visiting lecturer on sociology at Harvard.

Dr. Montagu has also served as curator of physical anthropology at the Wellcome Historical Museum in London, doing extensive research in natural history at the British Museum. He is the author of numerous books and articles published in a wide variety of magazines from the Saturday Review of Literature to the Ladies' Home Journal. A lecturer of note, he is on a speaking tour in the western part of the country now.

Since the female is the mother of the species, subject to all the strains of conception, pregnancy, and care of the young after birth, she must be stronger. And as mother of the species, she is more valuable.

Because of his larger frame and heavier musculature, the male's metabolic rate is five to six times higher, and he burns himself out more rapidly than the female. He dies more rapidly at every age and is less resistant to illness and other stress.

"Women will always remain the achievers in the biological areas of creation; than achievers in the outside world and not through any lack of intelligence, although an increasing number of women are making outside contributions. Women are endowed with intelligent love of humanity, and the love of a mother for a child is the highest form of intelligence.

"Women can best help men by helping them to bring out their potentialities to be good 'relators'—to love and understand their fellow humans. And women must assume the job of making men who will know how to make a world fit for human beings to live in. The greatest single step in this direction will be made when women consciously assume the task of teaching their children to be like themselves, loving and cooperative." Dr. Montagu concluded.
