Pay Boost Approximately 300 hourly rated personnel of Northrop Aircraft's Torrance installation will receive an additional one-centan-hour pay hike effec-tive April 29 as a result of the 0.9-point increase in the Consumers' Price Index re-ported for March 15, Whitley C. Collins, Northrop president, announced yesterday. The increase was based on a Consumers' Price Index of 18.9 for March 15 as com-pared to 118 reported for Dec-15, 1956. Cost of living adjust-ments are based on quarterly reviews of the index.
