**Volunteers for Children Story Is One of a Good Job Well Done**  
 A good job — well done! That's the story of Volunteers for Children, an organization devoted to the giving of love and tender care to the children patients of Harbor General Hospital.

"Volunteers for Children have, in a few short weeks, become indispensable to the children's division of Harbor General Hospital," states Dr. P. M. Wright, M.D., head physician, Department of Pediatrics, at the hospital.  
 "But the story is more than that. It's a story of a vision that has become a reality on the part of Mrs. Joan Stoddard of Torrance. Mrs. Stoddard organized the group after reading an article in the Saturday Evening Post of a similar group in New York City. Pateringling joined the volunteer group in Torrance when it had reached a membership of 61 since its inception Sept. 12, 1955.

To fulfill this basic need the group is dedicated. "It is rewarding to me to look over the last six months in retrospect and see all of the accomplishments our organization has achieved. From the start we knew of the tremendous need for an organization such as ours and we knew the effect it would have on the children at Harbor General Hospital. Now that the Volunteers for Children has been accepted as an integral part of the hospital I feel that each a day every member is to be complimented on the wonderful job she has helped our organization accomplish," Mrs. Stoddard said.  
 Reads, Enters Children. Each member donates a minimum of two hours a week reading stories, bathing children, playing games, and in general making them comfortable and cared for as though they were home.

**TEAC Meets For Luncheon**  
 The Torrance Educational Advisory Committee met for lunch Monday, Feb. 20, at the YWCA, with approximately 100 members and guests present. Discussion centered around the reading problems of children. Announcement was made at the meeting of the forthcoming lecture by Ben Solomon, nationally known authority on public recreation and youth problems, who will speak March 8 at the Civic Auditorium on juvenile delinquency.  
 "The annual fiscal report of the Torrance Department of Recreation was issued. It indicated that the number of school-age children living in Torrance increased from 4,838 in 1950-51 to 15,800 in 1955-56. Recreation attendance increased from 229,379 to 475,000 in the same period.  
 Total expenditure for 1954-55 according to the report was \$73,500.22, while the expenditure for 1953-54 was \$66,108.38.  
 Next meeting of the Torrance Educational Advisory Committee will be held March 12.
