

Football Schedules, Practice Scheduled At Local High Schools

Football coaches at Torrance and North Torrance high schools are over the decision of a majority to cut the gridiron schedule down for the fall season, it was learned today.

For the first time in many years, the Torrance High School Tartars will engage in only eight contests, one short of the customary nine. At North Torrance High School, where the Saxons played only eight games during the 1966 season, their first in athletic competition, the same number of contests has been authorized by school officials for the 1967 season.

Another facet of the admitted emphasis of the gridiron at both schools is the announcement that neither the Tartars nor the Saxons will commence practice before the start of school. In the cases of almost every other prep school in the CIF (California Interscholastic Federation) Southern Section, practice will begin on Sept. 3. Longhorns won't be able to don their togs until Sept. 10, because of the ruling.

Put Squads Behind Coaches Don Porter, of THS, and Cliff Graybehl, at North Torrance, said the late start of practice will put the local elevens about 10 to 12 practice sessions behind their opponents, since pre-school practice includes double sessions daily. No two-day practices will be undertaken by Torrance teams, since they will be in school when they open training.

The eight-game slate will put both Torrance and North Torrance teams at least one game, sometimes two, behind their opponents.

Torrance's first game is set for Sept. 28, as is North Torrance's initial grid test. But nearly every other school in the CIF begins play on Sept. 21.

School administrators said the cutbacks were a keen to place football in a proper "perspective" to other sports and also to keep in mind the goal of education above all other activities in the secondary school program.

Chet Albee, vice principal and director of athletics at North Torrance, said the eight-game slate is in keeping with a number of other schools in the Pioneer League, of which the school is a member. In many cases this is true, another source pointed out, but many of the institutions employing an eight-game slate begin play on Sept. 21 and merely enjoy a bye during their schedule.

He also said the late start of practice is being studied by other schools in the CIF and may become a reality for most member schools in the next few years.

John Shea, THS vice principal and athletic director, quoted a study by CIF officials, which said in part, "starting date for 1957 practice has not been set since a number of schools feel the opening day of practice should coincide with the opening day of school. League sharing this view are urged to bring this matter before the council (CIF) at the next meeting."

Face Rugged Foes The CIF's next meeting is set for April, at which time further action may be taken by other schools interested in the cutback, he said.
