A real Western hoe-down, complete to plaid shirts and jeans is promised by the Sister Kenny Foundation for its April 3rd Annual Western Round-up from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Sister Kenny Memorial Hospital and Rehabilitation Center in El Monte. Actress Rosalind Russell, foundation vice-president and member of the board of directors, will be present at this organizational meeting to greet guests and to look over the recently established neuromuscular ward which now admits patients suffering from cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, etc., and the Rehabilitation Center for both polio and other neuromuscular patients, which includes a completely equipped gymnasium, hydrotherapy unit, model rooms, and occupational therapy and speech therapy departments.

City chairmen from each area will be present and will be photographed with Miss Russell. Mrs. Fred E. Smith, of 2789 W. Carson Avenue, is city chairman of Torrance. All workers and volunteers on the Kenney campaign will be invited for the coffee and to register from 10 to 10:30 a.m., reopening until 12, and Chinese Wagon "hot dawgs" and coffee from 12 on. Awards will be presented to eligible city chairmen and division chairmen who have "scored" 100 per cent of their workers.
