

Hospital Board Adds 6 Members, Administrator JAHN TAKES SEAT ON COUNCIL; ISEN RETAINED IN MAYOR'S POST

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Recount Talk Gets Setback by Errors

Robert B. Jahn is a City Councilman by the slim margin of 15 votes, it was learned after counting of the absentee ballots by members of the Council here this week. And Mayor Albert Isen was re-elected to that post by a 3-2 vote.

After 20 of the 26 ballots were voted, Jahn received an additional four votes while his nearest competitor for the seat vacated by Mervin M. Schwab, Walter A. Garabrant, nine votes to his total.

It took the Council nearly five hours to count the absentee ballots and canvass the regular returns Tuesday. The absentee ballots, first matter on the agenda following opening of bids, were finally voted and counted only after Mayor Albert Isen had challenged all but two or three of them on various grounds. All ballots returned to the City Clerk in person, therefore bearing no postal cancellation, were finally voted despite the City Clerk's statement under oath that all ballots were received before the April 18 deadline.

of the Council, Blount, a member of the Council since 1950, has never been mayor.

Most of the agenda for the Tuesday meeting was canceled because of the long session on election returns. These matters will be returned to the agenda for the 8 p.m. meeting next Tuesday.

Announcement of the award of the contracts will be made on May 15, a board spokesman said.

The board of directors of the Torrance Memorial Hospital, in a busy week-end meeting, (1) hired a new hospital administrator, (2) increased the board from nine members to 15, (3) appointed six new members to the board, and (4) re-elected current officers to serve for another year.

Employed by the board to succeed Miss Elsa Hammerstrom, who submitted her resignation, was Leonard Ensminger, son of a noted Chicago surgeon. He is currently associated with the San Gabriel Valley Hospital and will assume duties here on May 1.

Six Named
Appointed to the board to fill out the quota of 15 members A. E. Thompson and Dr. Eugene Cook, three-year terms; Dean Sears and Mrs. Boris Woolley, two-year terms; and Mrs. Paul Loranger and Mervin Schwab, one-year terms.

Re-elected to serve three-year terms are Mrs. Charles Curtis, Mrs. Grover C. Whyte, and Otto Kreske.

Officers re-elected included Henry W. Creeger, president; Otto Kreske, vice president; Donald Findley, secretary; Mrs. Curtis, assistant secretary; and Dr. John Beaman, treasurer.

Groundbreaking Due
Opening of bids for the new hospital wing are scheduled for May 18 and groundbreaking is due June 1. President Creeger said yesterday.

Ensminger, who will take over as administrator May 1, studied medicine before World War II, but a battlefield injury forced amputation of his right hand and he switched to hospital administration after his release from service.

He received a business administration degree from Claremont in 1952 and a masters degree in hospital administration from the University of California in 1954.

In other business at the board meeting, according to President Creeger, the annual medical and financial reports were presented and approved.

Calvary Church Is Burglarized

Lomita's Calvary Church at 22501 Oak St. was entered for the second time in less than a week Saturday night with some pennies in a small bank in the Sunday school room taken, deputies have reported.

Four cents was the total amount of cash taken. Authorities added the raiders evidently possessed a passkey to the church since there was no evidence of forcible entry.

The same church was entered last Tuesday night but nothing was taken.

Two other Lomita churches—the Narbonne Baptist Church and the Lomita Presbyterian Church—also have been burglarized in the past 10 days. About \$18 in cash was taken from the Presbyterian Church. A tape recorder valued at more than \$200 was stolen from the Narbonne Baptist Church.

Victims Disarm Theater Robber

Torrance police and sheriff's deputies apprehended an armed robber on the spot here Monday at the Torrance Drive-In Theater, 5501 Torrance Blvd., after the theater manager and the bandit slugged it out with the robber coming out a poor second.

Fred Chancia, 51, manager at the theater and a former boxer, clobbered the robber over the head with a small electric heater to knock off a full 10 minutes of scuffling. Authorities arrived shortly after the melee to find Chancia and Leonard Ciorio, 64, a maintenance man at the theater, holding the culprit at bay by gunpoint.

Booked at Lennox sheriff's station on an armed robbery charge was Louis A. Baca, 32, of 21203 Borza St. He checked in with deputies with a huge welt on the top of his head but didn't require medical attention, they said.

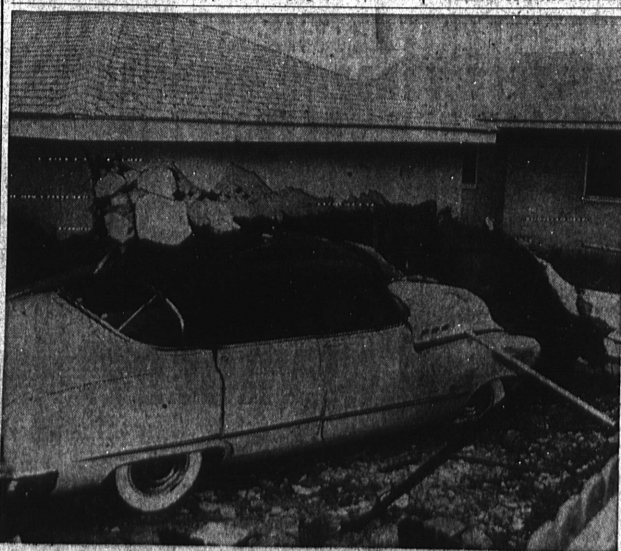
Baca told Chancia and Ciorio when he came into the office that he was a painter and wanted to know if there was anything he could paint for them. When Chancia said no, he drew a .38-caliber revolver and demanded to know where the safe was.

After forcing Chancia to open the safe, he tied the two up with some baling wire he

had with him. He then took \$700 from the safe, but apparently wasn't satisfied. He said he believed there was another safe on the premises, probably at the island checking station. After threatening the two with their lives if they didn't tell him, Baca said he would untie them if they would take him to the other safe.

Five shots were fired during the struggle, authorities said, but miraculously no one was hit by the barrage.

Deputies J. A. Jones and E. A. Kirby picked up Baca after receiving a call from Capt. Ernie Ashton and Mickey Fischer, Torrance detectives, who were first on the scene.
