DANISH COFFEE RING cups flour (sifted) ½ pt. sweet 1/2 pt. sweet cream or 1 cup canned milk 1 cake yeast dissolved in 1/4 tbsp. sugar tsp. salt cup shortening cup warm water A cup shortening cup warm water 2 eggs, well beaten Mix together in order given and beat well. Turn out on floured board and knead well. Put in a greased bowl, cover with a damp cloth and let rise until double in bulk. Knead again and roll ¼ inch thick and spread on filling. Roll like jelly roll, forming a ring on well-greased pan. Cut about every two inches, part way through ring. Let rise about one hour. Bake 30 to 35 minutes in 350-degree FILLING
