It isn't every Saturday night that "squaws" are invited to socialize with fathers and sons in the YMCA-sponsored Indian Guide Tribes. Not on your "smoke-signals!" Regular ses-

sions are ordinarily held at the YMCA with fathers and sons (the boys' ages ranging from 6 to 12), sitting in circles on the floor, holding a "pow-wow," all decked out in headbands and beating the Indian drums. A part of their regular Indian

ceremony is explaining how they earn their "wampum" for dues and planning their projects. One outing that the boys took was to the snow last year in chartered buses.

But this Saturday night all the tribes in Torrance got together and gave an Indian Guide potluck dinner. Even mothers, better known as "squaws," were invited. Over 200 families attended, including representatives from the Cheyenne, Arapahoe and Sioux tribes. After the dinner there was a program of community singing and movies.

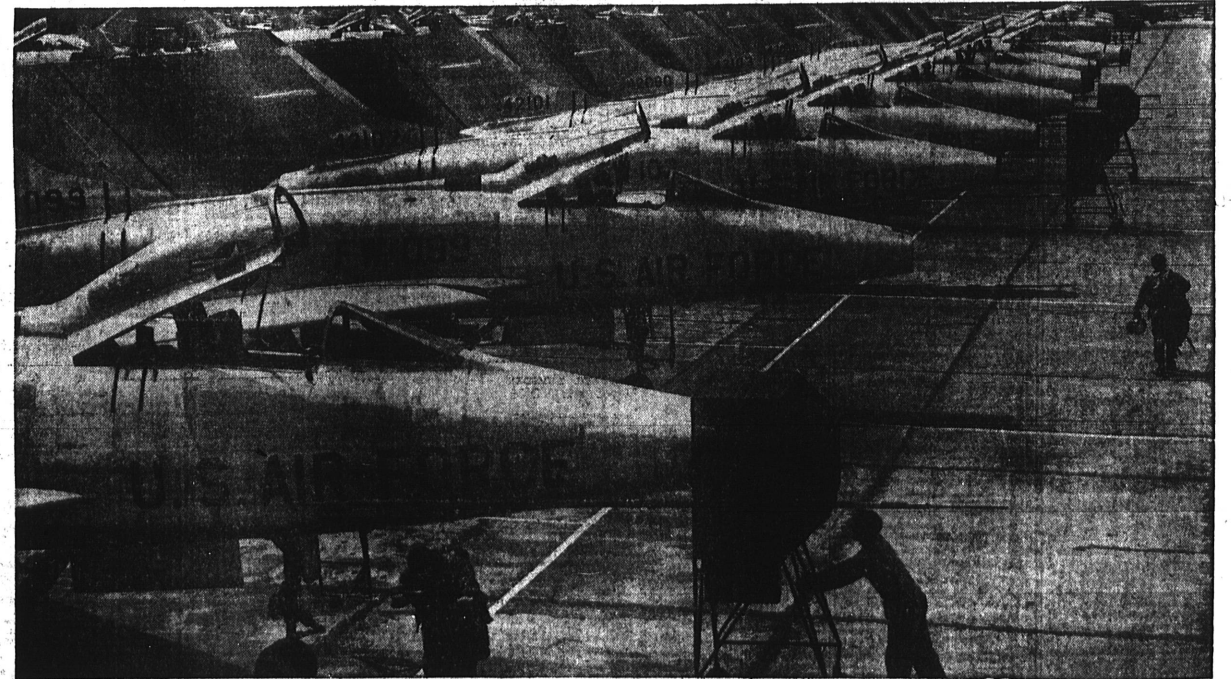

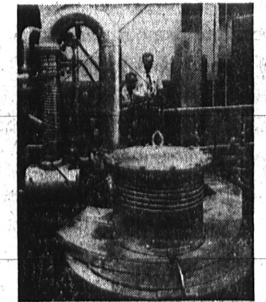

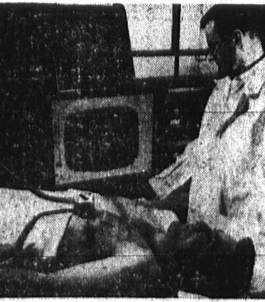
