Since the end of World War II the United States has contributed over \$60,000,-000,000 for foreign aid to friend and former foe alke in Europe, the Middle East and Asia. About \$40,000,000,-000 was for economic aid and some \$20,000,000,000 for military. Europe received 000 was for economic as some \$20,000,000,000 for military. Europe received about \$25,000,000,000; Asia about \$9,000,000; Asia About \$9,000,000; about \$3,000,-000,000; and some \$3,000,-000,000 to the rest of the world, just in economic aid. Military assistance of \$11,-000,000,000 to the Far East; \$3,000,000,000 to the Middle East, and over \$1,-000,000,000 to ther areas of the world.

This makes a total of about \$13, 000,000,000 to be spent for foreign aid this coming year. Since the death of Stain in 1953, the Soviet Union has been exerting considerable effort in increasing trad e with non-Communist coun-tries, and especially with neutrals. Numerous Soviet trade commissions have pre-ceded or followed the visits of Party Chief Nikita Kru-shchev and Premier Nicolai Bulganin to Asia, Europe and England. All this indicates that a seri-ous concerted effort is being made by Russia to wean neu-trals with obvious bribes for obvious sinister reasons. As is usually the case with cut prices and bargains there is the fly in the ointment. But even so, Russia cannot com-pete with the U. S. even on fair competitive terms, be-cause she cannot match the efficiency and economies of U. S. mass production. No na-tion on earth could match it for generations to come in
