Miss Cynthia Keyes, Harbor District Executive, was guest speaker, welcoming the girls into Camp Fire.

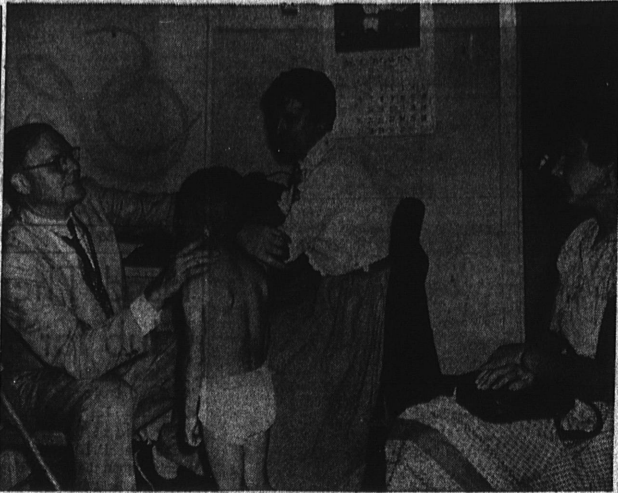
