Incidentally, the Board endorsed and worked for the approval at the polls of the proposal to effect pay for members of the City Council.



7. That if Stalin had lived another few months, all the present. Sowiet members of the Presidium, in clauding Krushchey, would have been executed.

These are some of the incredible statements Krushchev made during the Party Congress secret session and released to the world and the Russian people. The report is that Nikita Krushchev wept and passionately pleaded with the Congress to believe his words, and that Stalin's wave of terror among his own comrades brought Soviet Russia and world communism to the brink of disaster.

That the denunciation of Stalin is genuine is unquestionable. The underlying reason or reasons may not be fully recognized in the Unit-

tionable. The underlying rea-son or reasons may not be fully recognized in the Unit-ed States. To suggest, assome observers do, that it is just propaganda to lull us to sleep is preposterous to this report-er. There is a real crisis with-in the Communist party. We believe the Russian army, the Christian people, the farm-ers, the youth, the non-Rus-

sian population, the anti-Communists are joining forces and have been since the purges of 1937. We also believe that communism inside and outside Russia is losing its drive by the mere fact that more and more people are unwilling to sacrifice their inherent freedom for promises of even materialistic gains.

But in the final analysis it was not Stalinism a lone that was evil . . but the whole system of communism, its policies, its inhumanity and degradation of God, which was and is evil. The free world cannot be impressed with the deflation of Stalin by those who served him. What will impress the free world is the deflation of communism by those who detest world is the deflation of com-munism by those who detest it in Russia.
