**Well-Known Judge To Speak On Parents' Role In Raising Youth**

Residents of the Torrance and South Bay area will have an opportunity of listening to Judge William M. McKesson speak on the subject of the problems of parental responsibility of the upbringing of modern day youth at the "Challenge of Youth" rally to be held at the Torrance Civic Auditorium on Friday, July 20, at 8:30 p.m. Gerald Revell, chairman of the affair, has announced.

Judge McKesson was selected for this discussion because of his outstanding background in this field. Los Angeles Council of the Knights of Columbus is sponsoring the program which is open to the general public. In addition to his background in youth work, Judge McKesson has been active in the fraternal activities of the Masonic Order. He is a member of the Al Malinka Temple of the Shrine.

Former Juvenile Judge Judge McKesson is now serving as Judge of the Superior Court, Department 27. Prior to his appointment to that department he served as presiding judge of the Juvenile Court of Los Angeles County from 1951 to 1956. He was originally appointed to the juvenile court in 1944 by former Governor Earl Warren and served in that capacity until his appointment to the California Youth Authority in 1947. He returned to the bench in 1956.

He spent his early years in Colorado where he was graduated from the University of Colorado. After serving in the Army in France, he established residence in California and was graduated from the College of Law of the University of Southern California admitted to the bar.

Recognized Expert Judge McKesson is nationally recognized as an outstanding authority on youth problems. In 1955 he received the Youth Service Award from the Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce. He was recently nominated for the Lane Bryant National award for his work in "Preservation of the American Family."

Another speaker on this occasion will be Lt. John O'Grady, who is currently involved in the investigation of traffic, has more than eight years experience in this field, and has been instrumental in the arrest of over 200 narcotic peddlers and addicts.
