 Chamber of Commerce to bring about formation of a city there does not meet with the approval of the residents, and that no poll of residents has been taken.
 Much of the scurry to incorporate has been instigated by Lomita boosters who seek to block any further expansion of Torrance boundaries to the south, general local sources have stated. An attempt by developers of the peninsula to annex the area to Torrance last year was shouted down by Lomita, Palos Verdes Estates, and other community groups outside the area to be annexed.
 Others in County
 The local incorporation move is one of nearly a dozen now under way in the County. Several cities have been incorporated during the past year, leaving an ever diminishing unincorporated County area.
 Needed to incorporate any of the areas will be hearings before the boundary commission and establishment of those boundaries of the proposed city, signing of petitions by property owners receiving 25 per cent of the assessed valuation of the land in the proposed city, and a successful election.

Cal-Vet Assistance Available

Many Southern California veterans in need of additional schooling to advance in their trades, professions, or technical fields are eligible for immediate Cal-Vet educational assistance, according to Mrs. Helen Dill, director of the Community Chest supported Veterans' Service Center in Torrance.
 Mrs. Dill further states that California vets in many fields are finding themselves hampered by the rapid advance of modern technology. In such cases, where training is justified by regular employment, eligible veterans may obtain Cal-Vet schooling entitlement comprising tuition and fees, plus \$40 a month toward subsistence and \$10 a month for books and supplies.
