

## Early Sign-Up Set For Harbor JC Returnees

Students planning to return to Harbor Junior College in the fall will have the opportunity to sign up for the classes they wish to take prior to the regular registration in September, according to William H. McMasters, dean of admissions and guidance.

Any student, either day or extended day, will be able to completely register for all classes from Aug. 1 to Aug. 8. Hours will be from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. This applies to returning students only. A special pre-registration period will be set up later in the month for new students coming to Harbor Junior College for the first time.

Any student completing registration prior to the opening of school on Sept. 17 will not need to report to classes until Wednesday, Sept. 19, or the first scheduled class-meeting thereafter.

## Veterans Hospital Seeks Homes with Understanding

Main goal of the Family Care Program at the Veterans Neuropsychiatric Hospital, West Los Angeles, is a home with an understanding family, according to hospital spokesmen.

Patients who no longer need to be hospitalized are placed in private homes for further rehabilitation. These veterans have sufficiently recovered from mental illnesses so that they can live outside the hospital with a family group.

In order that patients find understanding and kindness in the families who offer them homes, placements are made with great care.

This group of patients have been provided with all medical and psychiatric care possible, but are still unable to "shift for themselves." They need additional help in adjusting to the problem of daily living.

Payment for room, board, and laundry in private homes is paid from the veterans' funds directly from the hospital and an additional allowance is given to the patient for incidental needs.

The urgent demand for ad-

ditional homes for the Family Care Program has developed out of the wide expansion of the project in the past three years.

The hospital staff is available for interviews with persons interested in the development of the program. Staff physicians at the hospital consider the program a continuation of hospital treatment and are available for consultation after a patient has been placed. The Social Work Service is responsible for the study and approval of homes for the placement of one or more patients.

During placement, professional help in care of the patient is offered to both patient and the sponsor through home visits and occasional meetings at Brentwood Hospital.

Placements are made for a trial period after the patient and sponsor become acquainted and can be extended for as long as three years.

More than 100 counties and communities from Siskiyou County on the north to San Diego County in the south will be represented.

Because of the elaborate, artistic and colorful manner in which the products, resources and opportunities of the respective areas are set forth, the displays have been likened to a stationary rose parade. Already artists and decorators are at work on the creations which promise to be more attractive than ever.  
Again, the striking decorative scheme blends with the spirit of productiveness and accomplishment. Gaily colored mobiles, aluminum cut-outs, different various operations on the farm against a background of hundreds of brightly colored fluorescent tubes. In addition to agriculture, the building also has the wine, dairy products and apiary divisions.  
An interesting innovation has been introduced this year on the huge stage, which occupies one entire end of the building. Through the fair there will be a series of educational motion pictures dealing with various phases of agricultural industry. The exhibits and displays are competitive and many thousands of dollars will be distributed in awards.
